What a strange time to write a newsletter! So much has been happening at Raebhat House since the turn of the year that we have been looking forward to sharing with you that now seem overshadowed by recent events. Though it was only a few weeks ago, it feels more like monthssince our offices and Community Space were shut indefinitely in line with efforts across the world to slow the spread of covid-19.

A lot of work has been carried out by our team to identify the needs of the community during this crisis, and to plan appropriate schemes that will offer lifeline support to the most vulnerable residents and alleviate pressure for everyone. A number of projects have also been designed to enable social groups, and educational classes, through digital methods of communication. Find out more inside!

The response to our recent letter to members, a fortnight ago, has been heartwarming to say the least. 20 Horshader residents came forward to volunteer their assistance in helping the most vulnerable - which now includes many younger people, and those in isolation. Community support has already begun, with assistance provided for shopping of food and other essentials, and for medical prescriptions. Everyone at HCD is working to improve these efforts and to arrange solutions at local level.

## Covid-19 Activities

On March 24th HCD took the decision to close the offices and Community Space at Raebhat House for an initial 3 weeks, in line with the national lockdown. Public access to the community allotments at Grinnivat Road and Dalmore was also suspended. Staff have largely been able to continue working from home, thank goodness for the internet and access to shared folders, clouds and such. But other important aspects of our work, the day to day engagement with the community, had to stop suddenly which has certainly been difficult, as it's crises like the current one that highlight the value of community led solutions to life's problems.

At short notice, we have been able to deliver key services to our community, working with neighbouring groups to coordinate efforts, and have been working to develop new services that will alleviate the fears and daily pressures of residents. By working together and looking after one another we will build resilience as a community, and may end up better able to deal with future challenges as a result.

Since the first week of lockdown HCD has managed the daily delivery of medication between Arnol and Dalmore. The amount of deliveries has now settled at a manageable level after being pretty hectic at first. Many residents have sent messages of appreciation for the service, which will continue as long as necessary. Delivering the prescriptions is vital in enabling more to stay at home, including some of the most vulnerable.

Community Support leaflets were distributed to each house in our area offering assistance with essential shopping, posting mail, etc, with volunteer contact numbers included. The purpose of the leaflet was to give any residents fearful of the rapid developments at the time a little peace of mind, especially those who have no internet or nearby family. Communication with the volunteers is continuous and we seriously appreciate their efforts. A small number of Food Packs were also distributed to residents following a donation of surplus perishable items from Eilean Siar food bank.

Jordan has been busy conducting a phone survey with all members. The information gathered will allow us to stay in contact with you, and will highlight the biggest issues facing us all.

Currently, we set to pilot our first Food Delivery Scheme on 9th April, and are developing a number of other services. These include: a system to distribute shopping (food and other essentials) to those in isolation and/or unable to travel to shops; support for families with young children; and provision of social and educational activities through digital platforms. Keep an eye out for developments; they'll be posted on social media, and sent by email/post to members.

## Community Growing Facilities - Grinnivat Road and Dalmore

The decision to suspend public access to the community growing sites was taken on Tuesday 17th March. Initially this will last the 3-week national lockdown at the end of which a review will take place before any announcement is made. Allotment holders will be kept up to date with developments.



At the moment we have planned for a number of eventualities, however if it's at all possible we will open the sites to allotment holders, although access may be restricted and on a rota basis. Whatever happens, HCD will follow national and local guidance to reach the best decision with regards to the safety of all users and HCD staff.

## Blasta Lunch Club & Food Delivery Scheme

The lunch club project picked off where it had left off at the end of 2019 as 3 fantastic lunches were held during the first 3 months of the year - all credit to the amazing cooks. A recent focus on French cuisine, inspired by a chance meeting at our weekly Coffee Morning, has led to offerings of Beef Bourignon, Potato Dauphinoise, Pistou Soup, and other exciting fare.

We are extremely disappointed to put future lunch clubs on hold until further notice, but are pleased to announce the trial of a Food Delivery Scheme developed with support from funder Eat Well Age Well, in partnership with 40 North Foods. The pilot run of the scheme will take place in April, with the intention of continuing deliveries of nutritious, high quality ready meals on a monthly basis. The scheme is open to those over 65 living between Arnol and Dalmore.
